I started quilting during the COVID years, I had been sending my granddaughter all kinds of crafts from Amazon. She would complete them within hours. We decided to get her a sewing machine for her birthday. Samantha, age 11 came down for her birthday and I taught her how to sew on the machine. Luckily my buddies, Sue Garrett and Barbara Callahan had been pestering me to come to quilting (I was a garment sewer from way back). They provided me with all kinds of scraps, I taught Samantha and realized how much I loved sewing and quilting. The rest is history; now I have a fabric stash problem!

I started sewing on a Kenmore in a wooden cabinet in the '60s. I still have it and it works beautifully! I now have a Baby Lock Chorus. Love it, especially the automatic needle threader and thread cutter.

I made a quilt when I was an early teen with fabric squares and an old blanket and I think I liked it? My favorite fabric is starched cotton. I have a huge stash with fabric bolts and everything. Help! I cannot stop buying. Is there a meeting for this addiction??

My favorite notions are sharp scissors and a sharp rotary blade. I sew about 9 hours/per week average. It's not enough! My favorite part of quilting is picking out colors and fabrics for my projects. 

Tlps of the Trade

- Use fusible batting when you machine quilt. The quilt is flat, easy to manipulate, and never puckers during quilting.
- Make a trial block to test the accuracy of the instructions before cutting all the fabric for an entire
 quilt. The practice block also gives you the opportunity to change fabric placement or replace
 fabrics that don't work well.
- Small paint brushes come in handy to clean lint from the bobbin case area of your sewing machine.
