



Our raffle table promises an exciting array of attractive prizes. There are always items that you just have to have!! We encourage you to participate and test your luck.


Library - Pat Gray & Lisa Albury

We take donated items once a quarter. (March 4, 2025 will be our last day for donations until September) Donate clean fabric no smaller than a fat quarter in size. It is not useful to have items not specific to quilting (yarn, paint, glues not used in quilting etc.). Your fellow quilters have not shown interest in these items. *Books and magazines*: These last months have taught us that the membership is not interested in printed materials. We have such a wonderful library and there is much information available online. Please donate them to your local library or other worthy cause.



I began quilting in the 1970's because I wanted something beautiful for my bed. Buying a quilt was pricey, but making one was not. That first quilt was a foundation-pieced Log Cabin, and my most recently pieced quilt was none other than a foundation-pieced Log Cabin. Am I stuck in a rut, or what?

I sew with a Bernina mostly from my huge stash of fabric (shared with my daughter). This lovely stash is 85% built from the world's cheapest source, garage sales. My favorite fabric is anything for free.

I have no UFO's because I'm not allowed to start a new project until the last one is done. That stringent rule makes my favorite part of a project sewing on the binding—last step, and I'm a free woman. My least favorite part of quilt making is doing the quilting. That step is totally bad for my health—gives me a pounding headache and makes me queasy. But I suffer through it because, after all, next comes the binding, and I smile all day.

TIps of the Trade

- To make threading monofilament thread easier, take a felt tip pen and color the end of the thread.
- A backing fabric with a defined print makes a great guide for an allover quilting design. Quilt from the back, following fabric pattern. Place the decorative thread you want to show on the quilt front in the bobbin.
- I use temporary spray adhesive for basting. I spray the wrong side of the quilt back. I then pin the back to my work wall. I open the batting and spread it on the sprayed back. Next, I spray the wrong side of the quilt top and smooth it on the batting. As a final step, I press both sides with a dry iron to literally "seal the deal."






